## DEVELOPMENTS AT SENIOR SCHOOL

Indeed, the transfer of boys from the Senior School site to the new site has made possible considerable developments at Senior School level also. The changes which have taken place, or are planned for this year, are as follows:

## 3. ROLLAND HOUSE:

Through the generosity of the Old Collegians' Association in agreeing to the investing of the Association's funds in the College, the first half of the purchase price of "Mossgiel," in Noble Street, has now been paid and the "Mossgiel," in Noble Street, has now been paid, and the property handed over to the College. A number of alterations will be made during the next month or two, and Rolland House will move in at the beginning of second term. This will give the junior boys very much better facilities and playing area than at present. They will stay in their new home until it is possible to complete stay in their new home until it is possible to complete the whole of the proposed boarding house at the new Preparatory School. When they eventually leave "Mossgiel," it is proposed that it should be used as the basis of a new Warrinn.

(f) a committee room for meetings of Old Boys or any other groups connected with the school,


(g) an extension to the school library, including school library, including suitable storage space for College archives,

## 5. ROADS AND GROUNDS:

The Council has been giving good deal of thought to the growing problem of traffic in the school grounds, both from the point of view of danger to boys and the restriction of playing space. The Dining Hall gates have The Dining Hall gates have already been closed to vehicular traffic, as these are the gates most used by pedestrians. This seems to have been a considerable improvement, as it allows freer movement of boys in the Dining Hall area, and has reduced the dust problem there. ADDITIONAL CLASS ROOMS AND SCIENCE FACILITIES: Preliminary planning has begun to provide at least one more Science laboratory, together with the additional class rooms which the increase in senior boys has made essential. It seems probable that it will be necessary to build a new class room block for this purpose just south of shrubs.

The money so far received has come as a result of outright gifts and in annual contributions. The great bulk of our contributions made their first contribution within the first trealers. within the first twelve months and experience has shown that amongst those who showed early interest, the 1961 contribution came in on time and already an appreciable number of third appreciable number of third year donations have been received in 1962. A small proportion of 1961 gifts are outstanding still and with memories of the credit squeeze and its brighter aftermath it seems certain that these friends will be up to date during this year.

## 1962 BUILDING PLANS

What a thrill to attend the opening of "Stage III" as we call it — the Assembly Room, Arts and Science Centre — at the Preparatory School. Stage III represents the first major and separate unit that can be credited exclusively to the current Building Fund and, as such, is a just cause for pride amongst all our contributors.

The reasons for pushing on with Stage III have already been explained but it should be repeated that without it, the Senior School without it, the Senior School would have been placed in an impossible position in 1962. With Stage III the Preparatory School has received major facilities for Assembly and Teaching. At Senior School, the improvement is very noticeable at Assembly in Morrison Hall and, less noticeable, in the improved space and study arrangements for the vital Form VI.

Form VI. Having started to build, it was intended that the proit was intended that the process could be continuous and Council approval to go ahead with Stage II was given in November, 1961. Unfortunately, pressure of other commitments with our architect caused planning delays and the contract has still not been let. All haste is being made and building activity should again be apparent in the near future.

Stage II will be a two Stage II will be a two storey block running South from the Library end of the main school. It will contain on Ground Floor level the Change Rooms which all parents have waited a long time to see. Also included will be a Dining Room which will allow the boarders to spend the greater part of each 24 hours at the new site. A small but important site. A small but important inclusion will be a Tuck Shop which the boys regard as essential. At first floor level, Stage II will contain some open space to be future open space to be future dormitories and the Bath and Toilet facilities for the Board-House.

ing House, Anticipated cost will be about £42,000, although the installation of plumbing fix-tures will be left until the Boarding House is completed.
