... So Says The President

At the annual meeting of the Old Geelong Collegians' Association in June, Brian Thom was elected President for the ensuing year.

Brian attended the College in 1950-53, played in the first football and cricket teams, and later took up accountancy with his father's firm, of which he became a partner. He is now general manager of the Capital Permanent Building Society. One of his daughters is a student at the College. He was asked for his thoughts on assuming office.

Coming in as President of this Association after lan Everist presents a challenge. The enthusiasm and dedication he brought to the position makes him a hard act to follow. But I was encouraged by the attendance of Old Collegians at the 80th annual dinner: it was one of the largest there have been, and there is strength in numbers.

The Association is much more than its President or its General Committee. After all, its primary object is to unite those who have attended the College and to foster good fellowship among them. We are united by a common interest in the College, its past, its present and its future, and, as I am also a member of the Council, I can assure Old Collegians that the College is going ahead by leaps and bounds, as is proved by the public demand for student places.

If, during my term as President, I can encourage more Old Boys and Girls to extend their interest to the OGCA and play an active part in its functions, we shall have built on the work of lan Everist.

When asked why I had accepted the position of President, I suggested it was the only way I could see of getting out of the job of Treasurer. But there is more to it than that: I trust I can do something for the College in return for what it has done for me. To do so, I need the support of all members of the OGCA, and for this reason I stress the need for participation in the Association's activities to the greatest degree possible.

I want to see more members at our dinner, our branch reunions, our yeargroup get-togethers and our sporting days. There is plenty to get into. The greater the participation of members, the better the social atmosphere we can create, and the more we shall all be informed about what is happening around the College. This in turn will build our unity.

I acknowledge the confidence the Association has placed in me and assure you the enthusiasm is there to see the OGCA and the College itself prosper and strengthen. With your enthusiasm too, we can fulfil our objects."

MONEY TALK

The OGCA, like the individual, is nowadays concerned about ever-increasing costs, and, still like the individual, needs an income - which, in this case, can come only from financial memberships.

As an example, the cost of mailing just mailing - this issue of Ad Astra is about \$1200. The recent postage jump added \$200. The Association has been sending Ad Astra to all 5000 OGCs, but it may soon have to consider limiting its coverage and adopting a selective mailing list.

It should be clear to all that a Life Membership taken out in 1930 at \$10.50 (five guineas), or in 1960 at \$21 (ten guineas), is now, through nobody's fault, of minimal value to the Association. Realising this, and without being told, some wiser senior (financial) members have lately made ex gratia contributions towards expenses. And the joining rate among present day leavers is heartening.

But scattered through the years there are OGCs who have never yet come to the point of giving realistic support. And there is still a large number of potential members among those who left school in the years 1963-78 (inclusive), when financial membership was waived in favour of contributions to the Geelong College Building Fund — which brought excellent results for the College but was to the financial disadvantage of the OGCA.

AT THE COLLEGE

CHAIRMAN OF COUNCIL



When Mr. Geoff Neilson retired as Chairman of the College Council last July, he was succeeded by Mr. Garnet S. Fielding LL.B., who is the sixth occupant of this important position since College entered the A.P.S. in 1908.

Mr. Fielding joined the Council in 1979 and became Deputy Chairman in 1980. He is aged 46 and married, with three children: his two sons are Old Geelong Collegians, and his daughter has just completed a two-year term on the College teaching staff.

Educated at Scotch College and Ormond College, Mr. Fielding took his law degree in 1956, since when he has practised as a partner of the firm of Messrs Whyte, Just & Moore, Geelong. Away from work, his interests embrace the Australian outdoors and the Italian culture: he speaks Italian, has travelled extensively in Italy, and is President of the Dante Society of Geelong.

In 1977 the President of Italy conferred on Mr. Fielding a Knighthood of the Italian Order of Merit in recognition of his work among Italian migrants in Geelong.

ENDOWMENT

The Council is continuing steady development of The Geelong College Endowment Fund, the objects of which were set out in Ad Astra in June 1980. Since then the corpus of the Fund has grown from \$83,000 to about \$183,000, and the Council desires to increase this to at least \$1,000,000 during the next few years.

Gifts to the Fund may take different forms, e.g. legacies or property trusts leaving the College as ultimate beneficiary. Gifts at present are not tax deductible for income purposes despite many submissions to the Commonwealth Government requesting that they be granted the same consideration as gifts to universities and other such institutions.

MR. NEILSON

1981-

Geoff Neilson entered the College kindergarten in 1935, since when, boy and man, he has filled most of the possible positions about the place. He has been connected with the government of the OGCA from 1950 to the present day, and this year was made a Fellow of the Association. He joined the College Council in 1960 and was chairman from 1978 to 1981.

At a recent school occasion Mr. Fielding spoke of Geoff's precious gifts used in the service of the College, his fine, lucid mind, his prodigious knowledge of all facets of the school, his wise and even judgment, along with the highest level of personal integrity.

Geoff gives the same loyalty and dedication to his profession of accountant, and there too he has risen to the highest level: last month he was installed as president of the Institute of Chartered Accountants in Australia, a very demanding position. It is for this reason that he relinquishes the College Chairmanship with regret.

We congratulate him on this latest honour and wish him a happy, successful term of office. We can also assure him that in the near future there will again be scope at the College for the exercise of his many talents.

MRS. PAT WOOD



Sadly, most good things come to an end, and it is with regret that Collegians, past and present, learn that Mrs. Pat Wood is retiring from the College staff at the end of this year.

In 1959 Mrs. Wood was appointed parttime librarian of the George Morrison Memorial Library. Very soon she was persuaded to accept full-time appointment and proceeded to transform and develop the old library into the modern facility, a focal point of College life, which it is today. Mrs. Wood's knowledge and appreciation of literature, her enthusiasm and administrative ability, together with her warm, friendly personality, enabled her to inspire her assistants, successive Library Councils and the College authorities to support and assist her in her notable achievement of building up the fine Resource Centre which the library has become. She attracted and encouraged students by her approachable and sympathetic attitude. with the result that the library is now a friendly, happy place attractive to students, while still a well-regulated area for study as a result of her firm control.

Mrs. Wood was the first lady on the Senior School staff and soon gained acceptance as a most welcome member of the Common Room. As a pioneer, she blazed a trail in that wasteland of male monopoly which has made the advent of other ladies to the staff much more pleasant for them. Her advice and influence have been invaluable also in the smooth introduction of co-education to the College since 1975.

In 1974 the O.G.C.A. elected her one of its first lady honorary members, and in 1981 she became an Honorary Life Member. Our best wishes are extended to Mrs. Wood in her retirement.

Claud Notman ('27) is one of those valuable regional historians who are saving a great deal of local lore from oblivion. "Of Sheep and Men", newly published, is not a catalogue of breeders and their breeds; though centred on the merino, it is also a documentation of the early settler's fight for existence.

Robert Ingpen ('50), in "Australia's Heritage Watch", presents in words and watercolours the argument as to whether the heritage value of certain buildings, e.g. the Geelong Club, is greater than the importance of the space they occupy

"Small Town Rising", a novel by Bill Green ('53), explores prejudices and motivations in a country town where aboriginal and white cultures conflict. Bill has just received a senior two-year grant from the Commonwealth Literary Fund, the only one awarded to a Victorian this vear.
