## A VISION Has Matured

In the early thirties the College council bought the property on the corner of Talbot Street and Mercer Parade with the idea of its being the site of a future boarding house.

Rev. Francis Rolland, the principal, saw the rambling old house as being ideally suited to provide "dens" where all sorts of arts, crafts and hobbies could be practised as well as its being a base for outdoor expeditions.

In 1934 he combed through the craft masters in the public schools of England where he was dismayed at "the fearful waste of wood and time" that went on. He found no suitable man in England.

On his return to Australia he enlisted the help of Professor G. S. Browne, the Professor of Education at Melbourne, who introduced him to John Bechervaise whose abilities as an art craft teacher and whose enthusiasm for discovery and creation were the qualities which Rolland had been seeking.

In an article "Joy in Education" written in 1936 he summed up the appointement as being of "a master whose special out-ofclass work will be arranging suitable recreation for boys whom the school games do not re-create."

Meanwhile, on April 27, 1935, the House of Guilds was officially opened and was an instant success.

Of the Ramblers Guild Rolland wrote "I am glad that there are parents who prefer their sons to take risks in rough places rather than loaf about the cities in their holidays. These journeys across untrodden peaks and unexplored valleys create a genuine patriotism. They reveal to a boy the very soul of his own country. A motorist glimpses only the hem of her skirt."

Some of the activities fostered by the House of Guilds under the guidance of John Bechervaise and Donald Webb have now become subjects in the school curriculum. Art, painting, ceramics, graphic communication, woodwork and textiles are electives and the production of stage properles, costumes and sets has become part of the drama course. In all these, however, the House of Guilds acts as a physical resource centre, providing workshop facilities throughout the full school day.

By the late 1970's the old building had reached the end of its useful life and the activities spawned there had floated away to other parts of the College pond.

Woodwork was in an ex-army hut cumdormitory at the back of "Lester Square," art was in the old Warrinn boarding house dormitories and graphic communication was taught in the art studio.

That it was all drawn together again into the Austin Gray Centre was because of the present principal, Mr. Peter Gebhardt, but that was only part of his scheme. He saw it also as a centre serving the community as well as the College. Here are some examples of this:

- An architect uses the facilities to make scale models of building designs and experimental roof trusses.
- A sculptor used the Houses of Guilds as a studio until he was able to set up his own.
- Environmental Science students have made a methane gas producer and other power conservation projects.
- A retired petrol tanker driver said that he dreaded retirement but that the House of Guilds, together with his bowls has made his life worthwhile. The same cannot be said of his golf, however.
- A young doctor setting up his first practice made all his surgery furniture at the House of Guilds.
- A fitter and turner has found that working with timber is a relaxing way of spending his time off as well as furnishing his new home.
- A young Melbourne couple are renovating their Brunswick house and spend weekends at the House of Guilds making special items.
- A retired farmer from Winchelsea, a housewife from Torquay, the Community Youth Support Scheme, Corilong centre for the handicapped and students from many government and independent schools are some of the hundreds of people who have made use of the House of Guilds since it became "open".

As well as this it is still the "HOG" to College students and is also the home for ceramics classes for Years 9 to 12 and Year 9 textiles. Of course there are problems with its multi-use but they are generally overcome by co-operation between users.

In 1935 the House of Guilds was setting new standards in the provision for leisure time in schools. Fifty years later its is showing the way in the use of school facilities to provide a community service.

# Historic Bell Stolen

Geelong College's 116-year-old solid brass bell will not ring through the school's Newtown cloisters next term.

The bell, which was given to the school in 1932, has been stolen.

It was inscribed with the words 'Otago 1869'. Property manger, Mr Ray Deans, said the bell was of sentimental value and historical significance to the college.

"The bell was used every day and staff would ring it to signify the end of each period," Mr Deans said.

College archivist, Mr Ewen McLean, said the bell originally came from the SS Otago — a Tasmanian ship hulked in the Derwent River.

It was acquired by Mr Archie Shannon whose Excelsior Woollen Mills partner, Mr Lou Hirst, had strong connections with the Otago's shipping agents, Messrs Howard Smith Ltd.

Mr McLean said evidence suggested the bell may have been passed on to another ship also named the Otago which was built in Glasgow.

That ship was sold to a New Zealand shipping company, McMeekan, Blackwood and Co, which later changed its name to The Adelaide, Melbourne and Otago Steamship Company.

Mr McLean said the New Zealand ship often travelled to Geelong. The Otago ran aground in Chaslands Mis-

take at the entrance to the Forveaux Straits.

"A giant salvage operation began as the ship had 5000 ounces of gold on board," Mr McLean said.

"It was probably then that our bell was rescued."

College staff have appealed for the return of the bell before school resumed next week.

"If someone wants to leave it in the quadrangle for us to collect, there will be no questions asked," Mr Deans said.

It is believed the bell was stolen once before as a schoolboy prank after a Head of the River dance held at the college in 1951.

"We don't know if this is a prank or not, but we are desperate for that bell," Mr Deans said. "It's a real part of our heritage.

### College's top job to a young old boy



Former Australian Test cricketer Paul Sheahan has been appointed principal of Geelong College from 1986.

It will be a homecoming to the school he served with distinction as a student until 1963.

Aged 38, he is not the youngest Old Collegian to become principal of the college. Mr Norman Morrison was 31 when he succeeded his father to the job in 1898.

Current principal, Mr Peter Gebhardt, finishes a 10-year term at the end of this year.

The position was advertised by the college council throughout Australia, New Zealand and the United Kingdom.

Mr Sheahan said yesterday he had thought about the possibilities of the post coming up, but had never been sure when.

He said Geelong College was a place for which he had great affection.

A mathematics teacher, he taught for three years in the Victorian Education Department, 11 years at Geelong Grammar (until 1983), with a period on exchange to Winchester College in the UK, and is currently second master at St Peter's College in Adelaide.

Mr Sheahan said Geelong College had been very successful academically and had a highly qualified and hard-working staff.

Chairman of the school council, Mr Garnet Fielding, said Mr Sheahan had sound experience in the areas of curriculum, senior administration and the pastoral care of students, and had involved himself in a variety of activities outside the classroom.

"The College Council is confident Mr Sheahan will make a fine contribution to the College and provide outstanding leadership in the years ahead."

Mr Sheahan played 31 Tests for Australia, amassing 1594 runs including two centuries. He is married, with three daughters.

### Merriman the Manager

While following the fortunes of the Australian cricket team in England this winter spare a thought for tour manager Bob Merriman ('48).

He cut his teeth in the job on a four of India a few years ago, was the manager in Australia last season, and will be at the helm again in Australia this summer.

He worked for years to have Geelong represented in district cricket in Melbourne in the Victoria Cricket Association.

Recently Geelong joined with the North Melbourne club to field a team in the association, and Bob is Geelong group chairman and a member of the committee of the combined club.

### Vale E.W. McCann

Mr Ernie McCann ('22) who served the college faithfully as a student and Old Collegian, died in Geelong in April.

A prefect in 1924, his sporting record is outstanding. He was in the athletics team in 1919, 20, 21, 22 (capt) and 23 and won the College Cup the same year, played in the first XVIII in 1922 and 23 (capt), and the first XI in 1922, 23 and 24 and VIII in 1924.

He was on the OGCA committee from 1945 to 1950, vice-president from 1951-57, and on the College council from 1958-73.

As a man in the Geelong community he "worked tirelessly for the economic, social, educational and cultural development of the region" (Geelong Advertiser, April 10, 1986).

The paper reported that as chairman of the Geelong Promotion Committee he was instrumental in negotiations to have Alcoa select Point Henry for its Australian manufacturing operations.

Also, that with others he fought against the odds to get Geelong a Performing Arts Centre, to found United Way (Community Chest), and gave of his time as a commissioner of the Port of Geelong Authority (Geelong Harbor Trust).
