# WHAT IS THE O.G.C.A.?

The O.G.C.A. was formally constituted in 1901 with the aim of "promoting the welfare of Geelong College and uniting those who have attended the Geelong College and to foster good fellowship among them, and between them and the Geelong College".

After 86 years the aims and objects have not altered. Over the years many tangible objects of a lasting nature have been supported by the Association as well as many individual Old Collegians.

Among the items of a lasting nature there are such things as Morrison Hall, War Memorials, Mackie Oval, Rolland Centre, as well as memorials to "John" Kerr, "Bully" MacRoberts, Teddy Rankin, Perce Carter and "Maggie" expressing the affection of thousands for these rare characters.

Just the fact that you attended the College makes you an Old Collegian, whether you are a financial member of the Association or not. Thanks to the generosity of the College Council we are able to send this Ad Astra to as many as we know their whereabouts. If you enjoy reading it we would appreciate your support by joining the Association so we can effectively realize the aims as stated above. (Life Membership \$85.)

Fortunately, due to those that went before, we have contact with approximately 5,500 of 6,600 still known to be living.

Enough of the past, how do we fulfil the aims of the Association in this day and age? A committee of Old Collegians meets four times per year and is responsible for the general operation whilst the Executive Officer looks after the day to day affairs.

Social events are promoted wherever a group can get together, be it Year Groups, Class Groups, Past Crews, teams or Area Groups with regular dinners being held in Sydney, Canberra, Willaura, Hamilton, Ballarat, Camperdown, with the Annual Dinner meeting in Geelong or Melbourne.

Sporting events form a large part of the social activities through such organisations as the Albert Bell Club, Old Collegians' Hockey Club, Old Collegians' Netball Club, Old Geelong Football Club, Geelong Amateur Football Club, with teams being entered in the Associated Public Schools Scholars' Golf Day, OGG/OGC Golf Day, Associated Public Schools Bowls Day, and

competitions in cricket, tennis and football with present students.

Through all these activities we are able to promote the welfare of the College whilst providing good fellowship among the competitors.

Among the tangible items, the Committee has an opportunity to make suggestions for the efficient operation of the school - no doubt, whilst you were a student you often wished you could give your tutors some advice as to how it should be done - this is your opportunity.

As in the past, financial and moral support is given where possible. Many team coaches are Old Collegians, many of the extra coaching aids are donated and building programmes are supported.

One further development in the life of the College is the establishment of the Geelong College Foundation Ltd., a body whose role is to develop a long-term focus for the interest and support of the wider College community, ensuring the continued existence of the College as a major Christian education institution.

As with any expanding organisation, alterations and additions are always necessary to buildings and the College Council has decided to convert the House of Music, built in 1937, for use as a chapel.

There could be some Old Collegians who would welcome the opportunity to assist with this project. Although the cost of the building itself would probably be beyond their capacity, the furnishings are within range, and the pews, chairs, etc., could be dedicated to the memory of individuals as are the chairs and tables in the Dining Hall.

You may or may not agree with the thrust of the O.G.C.A. activities but, whichever it is, do make your ideas known, after all, it is your Association and the committee is there to consider your wishes.

#### CHAPEL

Members of the school community will be aware that the College Council has accepted in principle the recommendations of the Preliminary Strategy Planning Committee that will see a modest increase in the size of the school as well as the provision of certain facilities that the school presently does not have.

The conversion of the old House of Music, on the corner of Talbot and Aphrasia Streets, is one of those projects, and the building of a chapel is seen as an integral part of the provision for the spiritual well-being of the students. In addition, it is hoped that Old Collegians will consider using the Chapel for their marriage services. In this and other ways, the Chapel will be seen as a vital link between the present and past College communities and will be seen by all as, perhaps, the focal point of the lives of students at the College.

It will be remembered that individual Old Collegians contributed to the furnishing of the Dining Hall in 1929 by the buying of chairs on which there are name plates; with a similar idea in mind the College is encouraging its past students to contribute to the furnishing of this wonderful new chapel by making a donation for specific objects within it. Contributions for pews, lecterns, an altar table, even a pipe organ will be very gratefully received by the school and will be specially remembered by the College community as gifts from those individuals or families.

#### THE GEELONG COLLEGE FOUNDATION INAUGRAL DINNER

The Chairman of the College Council, Mr Garnet Fielding, in proposing the Toast to the College said:

"Mr President, Ladies and Gentlemen: Some 15 years ago, in this Hall, the present Governor of this State said that one of the things our community needed most was education with bite. Never was a claim more truly made.

The desolation, apathy and discord in some areas of public education, the vulgarity and gracelessness of much in contemporary life, and the enormous difficulties faced by the young (on a scale never known before) convince us that never was good and sound education so vital for the restoration of the health of our society as now.

The College Council's charter is to provide for our students 'a liberal, humane and balanced education in which are fostered their intellectual, physical, moral, aesthetic and spiritual growth, and in which Christian faith, worship and practice find appropriate expression'. What a responsibility and privilege!

The College Council through its Principal and staff aims to encourage that reflective self-reliance which is the foundation of a fulfilled life.

The College aims at teaching students to think - not to emulate the flabby, gelatinous process that passes for thought in much of society but to use intellectual rigour; not only to know the right answers, but how to reach them. Not only to know, but to discern, to distil and to assess:

Beset as we are by the deadly malaise of passive recreation, the School aims to teach its students to avoid a paralysis of the imagination.

As a Christian school it aims to encourage consideration of the interests of others, so that when they leave here our students may be well-armed against the influence of the cult of the selfish.

As a Christian school it must always aim to articulate decency.

Mr President, the Council has four great advantages in discharging its office:

First, 126 years of rich tradition of providing education for the families of town and country. Years marked by the labours of committed and talented people who have put this School in the vanguard of Australian education.

Second, a truly first-class staff so ably led by our Principal. A staff whose didactic skills are only equalled by their dedication to the welfare and advancement of their students.

Third, an amenable and largely gracious fabric which provides an ideal setting in which to work and play. A fabric which is the result of careful management in the past, much generous benefaction and no little sacrifice.

Fourth, a reservoir of goodwill among those families who have enjoyed an education here, are doing so now, or aspire to do so in the future.

What then are the causes of concern?
There are three and they are of enormous importance for the future of the School:

We cannot and dare not be complacent. There are opportunities for improvement in and enrichment of the College's offering and they must be seized. To stand still is to slide back. The wages of complacency are mediocrity, and mediocrity must never be a word in the College vocabulary.

Second, through endowment the College must seek to open its doors more widely to the community. The community needs the College as never before. As a Christian school we owe it to our fellows that the financial bar against the entry of deserving scholars be lowered.

Fundamentally the aim of the College is to become free and truly independent. Our parents (who as taxpayers share the gargantuan cost of maintaining the Government education system) receive Government aid in the payment of a part of their tuition fees. This aid for some time has been under varying degrees of threat of withdrawal and as we know, in the case of the College and some other schools, has been diminished. There is a twin threat of political interference in school government and political interference in school curriculum in those schools where aid is accepted. Such interference is anathema to schools like this. We are determined to be independent and free.

Someone has said that challenges consist of threats and opportunities and the secret of success is to convert the former into the latter.

Council must, and the whole School community should, think not only in terms of minutes and hours but in the long swing of events. Just as we now have been provided for by the efforts and sacrifices of the past, so we, in our turn, have the obligation and privilege to provide for the future.

Mr President, more than 400 years ago one of the first generation of great Jesuit schoolmasters wrote:

'Puerilis instutio renovatio mundi' -

'In the education of our youth lies the renewal of the world'.

He was absolutely right and let us never forget."

## THE FOUNDATION DINNER

An edited version of the Principal's response follows:

"As our Council Chairman has put it admirably, this is indeed a most auspicious occasion for the school whose history has been studded with outstanding events.

In these days when there is great uncertainty about issues like the continuation of Government Funding and the ability of our schools to continue to provide the resources, both material and non-material, that are necessary, the launching and the establishment of a Foundation is absolutely necessary to maintain our enviable position in Australian education.

I do believe fervently in our current crop of youngsters who will become the leaders of society in the future. They are clear eyed, they are thoughtful, they are hard working and they are quite optimistic about the future. Youngsters have a great deal to cope with and an undeniable responsibility rests with schools like this to encourage in these youngsters the development of a strong and reliable moral framework. If we, in independent schools, cannot do it, then who can?

But I don't believe that students can achieve the ideals that we think are important and that we set for them - to become caring, compassionate, contributing and concerned adults - unless we, as the older generation, set some sort of example for them. The Foundation will draw together these avenues of support to help us achieve our worthy aims.

Already we have seen some mighty work undertaken by the Foundation Board under the tremendously energetic Presidency of Mr Geoff Betts, a highly respected member of the College community who is one of few Fellows of the Old Collegians though not an Old Collegian himself. Assisted by the two Vice-Presidents, Mr Geoff Neilson and Mr Robert Purnell, and the other Board members, Mr Scott Chirnside, Mrs Elizabeth Farrow, Mr Neil Gow, Mr Alec Gray, Mr Ken Nall, Mr John Richardson and the Foundation Director Mr Bob Grant, Mr Betts has already laid the groundwork for this extremely important arm of the College.

We, in independent schools, must see that a narrow utilitarian aim for education is stultifying and degrading to the human spirit of endeavour and achievement but, we as educators at the College have been set a formidable task:

'To provide for students a liberal, balanced and general education with the purpose of fostering their intellectual, aesthetic, physical, spiritual and moral growth, and within which Christian faith, worship and practice find appropriate expression.'

How especially important it is these days for us to provide that liberal balanced and general education? Thus, small but important things to master like the art of conversation, the development of fruitful leisure time instead of constant and mindless television watching, assume considerable importance and are matters that independent school education should encourage and cultivate at every turn.

If we are to discharge our duties properly and achieve our goals, we need the help of the whole College community and the Foundation will galvanise this assistance.

Whilst I am pleased, therefore, to respond to the toast of the Chairman and to thank him for his kindness, it gives me great pleasure, also, to propose the health of the infant Foundation, a body within and without the school, that is dedicated to maintaining the well-being of the College.

This is a proud school. This is a school that has nurtured so many minds and souls in the past and will in the future. This is a great school. With the continued support of the College community, this will continue to be a great school. There are exciting times ahead, so I call on you to be upstanding and join with me in drinking this toast to The Geelong College Foundation."

## THE FOUNDATION DINNER

The President of the Foundation, Geoff Betts, in response stated that the need for a new organisation to carry support for the College into the 21st Century had become apparent. The activities of existing groups were most valuable but the Foundation had a wider charter of membership and longer focus of action. To guarantee the future independence of the College we needed to rally our supporters by the thousands and a permanent fund of \$10 or \$20 million dollars was not an understatement. Our perspective needed to be of 10-20 even 50 years. The Foundation offered a different concept of membership.

 A membership that will not be limited by any short term factor such as student days or fee paying years.

 A membership that will provide an open door to the College campus at any time and a warm welcome to all College or Foundation functions in the future.

 A membership that will create a feeling of oneness with the future of this great school and an opportunity, through the nature of the Foundation, to have some influence on the future growth and direction of the College we all love.

Membership qualifications will be the same for everybody - one level which will not embody any hierarchy of relative wealth.

Our emphasis is, firstly, to develop the widest base of personal support on a friendly and welcoming campus, but the reality is that financial resources must be equal to the task so that membership of the Foundation will be actively sought.

Individual membership can be acquired by the gift of not less than \$3,000 over three years, or a bequest of not less than \$15,000. Corporate membership is based on a gift of not less than \$30,000. Tax benefits and deferred payments are possible and details are available from the Foundation office.

Geoff closed his remarks with an invitation to all present to show their support for the College by actively participating in Foundation activities and, as appropriate joining the growing number of dedicated members.

## O.G.C.A. DINNER -FRANCE -1917

TONY DOUGLAS, ("50), of "Garston", via Wentworth, has sent an extract from the diary of his father GERALD DOUGLAS, ("10), detailing a dinner held by O.G.C.s and O.G.G. at the height of the First World War, 7th July, 1917, at Albert. We thought it worth printing:

July 7th, Saturday (At Rubempre) - Fine and warm. Leave application refused. Damn 'em. Take French leave. All in own time too. Out with Lewis Gunners in orchard all morning. About 4,30 went to Bde. Hdgrs. and there met Flo Pearson, Billy Leggatt, Tom, Ken, Keith Doig, and Lt. Kelly. Motor bus awaiting, 'cept Kelly all O.G.C. boys, K. a.G.G. boy, Bumpy old ride thro Herricart, Contay, Warloy to Albert. Stopped at Officers Cafe. Went upstairs to room reserved for the reunion dinner of Old Geelong Collegians and Grammarians. Tables nicely laid out and waited on by Tommies, canteen chaps. About 36 of us there, and mostly old G.C. boys. Knew about 25 of those present, All ranks there from Ptes. to S't Colonel. Tres bon to meet old cobbers again, and for a few hours we were all boys back at the old school. Recalling incidents and other what-nots. Wouldn't have missed the reunion not for something. Worth getting clinged for. Good dinner, wine in plenty. H<sub>2</sub>O for me. Cigars a treat. Yarning after. Numerous speeches, toasts, concluded ab. 10 with Auld Lang Syne. Bus ready for us on back trip.

1st course, soup. 2nd Fish. 3 kinds of tripe. Jack had to know what animal it was from. 3rd, Ham, peas and spuds. Pudding, pears and apricot. Cafe Noir to end up. Champagne and Port flying and some other. Jack, Keith Doig president and Joey Porter chairman, both most capable. This reunion is the first of many I hope. A representative for each divn. has been chosen. Doig is for 5th. A few rather inky pinky as evening wore on. Chatting with all I knew. Jack Rodgers on one side and Hal Sewell on other for Auld Lang Syne. Got 32 names out of 35 down on my "me-and-you" card. Keep it as souvenir of the event.
