VALE J.A. CARRINGTON

John Archdall Carrington came to Geelong College from Ballarat Grammar School at the beginning of 1940. He was appointed House Master of Mackie House which had opened in 1939 under the supervision of the Vice Principal, Mr. A. T. Tait. For the next twenty eight years he devoted all his skills, talents and time to building and maintaining a healthy environment in which successive genera-

tions of younger boarders could develop. During most of his time as Housemaster, Mackie House was the place where boarders were accommodated during the years when they first entered senior school. He believed that in most cases boys were happiest and developed best in an orderly environment where the rules were just, clearly understood and consistently enforced. His House comprised about seventy boys who were 13 or 14 years old and who were looked after by a small number of VIth Form boys who were prefects and by a committee consisting of

boys who had previous experience of Mackie and who remained to assist in the smooth running of the House. Mr. Carrington chose his prefects and committee members with great care and he did not spare himself at all to ensure the welfare of his charges. For instance, he rose at 5 a.m. each morning to stoke the boiler so that the supply of hot water for showers was assured and last thing each night he checked each dormitory. He set high standards for himself and he demanded high standards from all members of the House whether students or assistant staff members. He knew his students well and was deeply concerned for the welfare of each individual so that

the relationship between Housemaster and boy was almost always cordial although some will recall the severity of the admonitory interviews in his study which were sometimes necessary.

Most of his classes were for Accounting or Business Studies but he particularly enjoyed teaching history, especially the French Revolution period. Many recall his history lessons as being a source of

inspiration and enthusiasm. In his earlier years he coached both under-age cricket and football teams and he actively supported the Glee Club in its annual production of a Gilbert & Sullivan opera. Mrs. Carrington, who was a talented pianist, was the regular accompanist for the Glee Club rehearsals and performances. In some years Mr. Carrington was responsible for the oversight of the Dining Hall and he showed the same dedication to preserving orderliness and seemly conduct there as he did in running Mackie House. As liaison master he estab-

lished excellent relationships with the Refectory Staff. He was very well regarded and esteemed by his colleagues of the Common Room.

After retiring at the end of 1967, Mr. Carrington became accountant for a legal firm in Geelong and pursued his new career for over fifteen years. Mrs. Carrington died in 1980 and Mr. Carrington lived alone in Newtown till his death on 5th February at the age of 85 years.

The College Council has named the playroom in Mackie House "The John Carrington Room" and a plaque has been placed there as a permanent record of his outstanding contribution to the life of Geelong College.

FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Appointment of New Vice Principal





Members of the school community will be aware that Mr. David Happell resigns from the end of 1988, although he actually leaves the staff when the Year 12's take their study period prior to the V.C.E. examinations in November.

After a lengthy and quite exhausting process, I have appointed his replacement. The new Vice Principal will be Mr. John Gibson who is presently a Group Master and Head of Chemistry at Haileybury College in Melbourne. In a most impressive career to date, Mr. Gibson has, amongst other things, been Head of an academic department, Head of a Senior Boarding House, Head of a Day House, a Group Master, and Chairman of the V.I.S.E. Chemistry Sub-Committee. He has been on the staff at Haileybury for the past 18 years, during which time he spent two years at the Felsted School in England.

As well as his academic talents, he has a keen interest in extra-curricular things, including sport. He is 42 years old, is married, and his wife is Head of English at Firbank School, and they have three sons, aged 14, 13 and 11.

I look forward very much to the time when the school community can meet him.

Appointment of New Bursar

After what will have been 27 years of very distinguished service to the College,

I have appointed his replacement - Mr. John Kaye - who will assume duties at the College towards the end of 1988 so as to ease the transition.

Mr. Kaye is presently Bursar of the Goulburn Valley Grammar School and has been since its inception. Prior to that he has worked with an International Trading Company, with a firm of Chartered Accountants, and with one of Australia's manufacturing companies, Repco Limited.

We look forward to having Mr. Kaye, and his wife, and their three children with us later this year.

Buildings and Works

The facilities at Middle School have been considerably enhanced with the addition of a second Science laboratory and two classrooms. The Science laboratory is particularly inviting and well-equipped and we hope that it will encourage many girls and boys to develop and follow their interests in the sciences.

A new building is nearing completion at Campbell House and this will provide much needed activity space for subjects such as Dance, Physical Education, Drama and Movement. As well as the main space, this project will provide improved changing and toilet facilities for the children and will create increased accommodation for the library.

Automatic watering systems have been installed in several areas adjacent to the Middle School buildings and water supply and drainage works have been undertaken on the playing fields south of the central access road. A considerable improvement to the playing surface on the sports fields is expected to follow.

NORTHERN TERRITORY EXPEDITION

During the July vacation, forty students from College will be embarking on a twelve day expedition to the Northern Territory. The tour includes visits to Alice Springs, Ayres Rock, Mataranka, Katherine Gorge, Kakadu National Park and Darwin.

The expedition will cost \$900 per person, including flights to Alice Springs and the return journey from Darwin back to Melbourne.

CHINA TOUR

Thirty five members of the College community (twenty seven students, eight adults) will leave Melbourne for Beijing on Saturday, 25th June, 1988. We have been very encouraged by the response to this initial international tour and trust that it will be of great enjoyment and benefit for all concerned.

GRANDPARENTS DAY

Over 200 Grandparents, including a number of Old Collegians, arrived at the College Preparatory School on March 29th at the invitation of the year 4, 5 and 6 students.

The Children were hosts for the day which began with a concert followed by a tour of the school and environmental centre and their home classroom. After the picnic lunch, which was also provided by the children, all were transported to the Senior School Austin Gray Centre (the Old Preparatory School) where they were greeted by the Principal, Mr Sheahan, and taken on a tour of the school by the prefects. Afternoon tea was served in the Dining Hail

The day was initiated by the Foundation to bring families closer to the College and implemented by the staff of the Preparatory School. All agreed that the students were very good hosts.

INCORPORATION OF ASSOCIATION

The General Committee of the O.G.C.A. has recommended that the Association become an incorporated body.

Dan Simmonds, a solicitor and committee member, has undertaken the task and after several draft proposals the committee will present the fully revised Statement of Pur-poses and Model Rules for adoption at the Annual General Meeting to be held in the Geelong College Library, Talbot Street, New-town, on 23rd July, 1988, at 5 p.m.

The aims and objects have not changed but the general operational sections have been amended to comply with the Associations Incorporation Act.

One of the principal changes is the reduction of the General Committee from, Office Bearers, 18 members and 2 co-opted members to Office Bearers, 12 members and up to 4 co-opted members with corresponding reduction in the quorum required for a meet ing.

Provision has also been made for the accounting to follow the financial year and the Annual General Meeting to vary from the present "not later than 31st July" to "no later than the 31st October each calendar year", so the meeting may be held in conjunction with the Annual Reunion Dinner.

The party sailed from Geelong on the Lexcen designed, two-masted ketch, "Jura", with owner skipper Richard Simonsen (father of old collegians Kate ('81), James ('77) and Michael ('83) and crewman, Bram McLeod ('80).

A landing was made at the 1941 site under perfect conditions on April 2nd and the party left in equally favourable conditions four days later after making surveys to complement the work of previous expeditions.

The main impression brought back by the "revisiter" was that the island is as beautiful as ever but the slopes are at least twice as steep as they were in 1947.
