MACKIE HOUSE - FIFTIETH ANNIVERSARY



Mackie House 1939

On 14th December, 1938, the then Governor-General of Australia, Lord Gowrie, opened Mackie House. This was the last of four notable buildings designed by Mr. Philip B. Hudson and erected in the 1930's at the College; they were the Refectory Block, the South and West wings, including the cloisters area, the House of Music and Mackie House.

Mackie was modelled upon an English Manor House and contained several spacious dormitories upstairs, while downstairs there was a study-room and a play-room and many other smaller rooms. It had a flat for a resident Housemaster, also.

"Pegasus" of June, 1939, states; "Architects have unanimously approved the linking up of the grounds placing in the two extreme corners of it the House of Music, and this new boarding house, two Tudor buildings that look across to each other. In beauty and in convenience, in light and air, Mackie House can have few equals in Australian schools. An English headmaster who recently visited the College declared that there was nothing better of its kind in the Empire".

Mackie House was first used as a Boarding House in 1939, under the oversight of Mr. A. T. Tait, the Vice-Principal. In 1940 Mr. John A. Carrington was appointed the first Housemaster and took up residence in the flat with Mrs. Carrington. This was to

be his home until his retirement at the end of 1967.

For more than twenty years Mackie was the home for the youngest boarders in Senior School. A small group of older boys remained in Mackie each year to form a Committee to assist in the running of the House and three or four senior boys lived there as prefects. The students studied in the large study room under supervision of a master each night.

There was a change in 1962 when the "vertical" House system was introduced and Mackie House became a house of about 75 students drawn from all levels of the Senior School. It formed a unit in the house sports' competition with the colour of light blue. However, in 1974 another change made Mackie the home base of boarders, drawn from each of the sporting houses and the light blue colour was adopted by Coles House.

Subsequent to the retirement of Mr. Carrington in 1967, Mr. A. D. Mahar was appointed Housemaster. Under the influence of the climate of that time considerable changes were made in the interior appearance of Mackie, involving the extensive use of partitions to provide each individual student with greater privacy. The changes did nothing to enhance the appearance of the interior of the building but provided each student with a cubicle in which he could study and sleep. The Housemaster was no longer resident in the building but occupied one of the near-by houses and this arrangement has continued.

Mackie has always been a boarding house for boys. The only time that the girls have used its facilities was during the brief period when the downstairs shower room, play-room and locker room became the changing rooms for all the girls when the Rolland Centre was being constructed.

THE PRINCIPAL

NON-GOVERNMENT SCHOOLS' FUNDING

In 1992 the current eight-year plan of school funding from Federal sources comes to an end. The long awaited Post-1992 Funding Options Paper for schools, produced by the Federal Minister for Education, Mr. John Dawkins, has been circulated in the form of a discussion paper which really offers no options at all. Fundamentally the resources agreement with schools like the College will not alter, so it will now be possible to plan financially in a climate of relative stability.

In summary the proposals in the discussion paper seek to build on the eight-year funding scheme that was put in place in 1984. It cannot be disputed that this scheme has given stability and security to non-government schools in the period since 1984, and it is encouraging to see that the discussion paper proposes to retain the key elements of the existing funding scheme, that is a base per capita grant, needs based funding over and above the per capita grant, and the twelve funding categories.

STAFF CHANGES

John Nelson, Director Curriculum at the Senior School and a member of the College staff for fifteen-and-a-half years, has taken up a new appointment as Vice-Master of Ormand College. In his time of sterling service he has been, amongst other things, Head of a Day House as well as Director of Curriculum. His perception and judgement were impeccable and his presence will be missed. I am confident, however, that his successor, Mr Geoffrey Millar, currently Head of Science at Pembroke School Adelaide, will fill the position with great distinction, and we look forward to welcoming him and his wife, Cynthia, to the College community at the beginning of 1990.

NEW COAT OF ARMS

The College of Heralds in England granted letters patent to the College for its Coat of Arms so that the Arms now become the property of the College and cannot be used in part or in whole by anyone without the written permission of the College.

The Arms in their old form did not quite meet the standards of heraldry so they had to be modified slightly. You will notice that the front cover of Ad Astra bears the new Arms to the left of the title.

All College stationery will bear the new Coat of Arms, without the mantling and the helmet, when present stocks have been exhausted. I might also add that the Senior School Parents' and Friends' Association has commissioned a large tapestry of the new Coat of Arms from a local weaver and when completed it will hang in the Morrison Hall.

NO SMOKING

I was very pleased that the Staff Associations at both the Senior School and Preparatory School took a decision recently to declare all areas inside buildings on College property as 'No Smoking' areas.

Few, if any, members of staff smoke anyway but it is a tangible sign that the staff is committed to this particular policy and it is hoped that visitors to the College will respect the decision, too.

BUILDING PLANS

The contract for the construction of the Performing Arts and Music Complex at the Preparatory School has been let to Len Bell and Son, Builders. Construction work has begun and, despite the recent long stretch of inclement weather, there is every expectation that the new facility will be in operation at the beginning of 1990.

A newly refurbished play area is under construction at Campbell House, and a new vehicular layby on Aberdeen Street will be constructed soon.

It will be of interest to members of the College community to note, also, that the new Multi-Purpose Room at Campbell House was officially named the 'Joan Sweetman Room' in recognition of Mrs Sweetman's wonderful service on the staff of the College. She was appointed in 1947 and became Director of the Kindergarten, as it was known at that stage, in 1949, a position she held until her retirement in 1978. She was also the first female Honorary Life Member of the O.G.C.A.

CHAPEL ORGAN

The community will be aware that the College Chapel was dedicated in a service conducted by Sir Ronald Wilson, the President of the Assembly of the Uniting Church in Australia, on Wednesday, 8th March, 1989. The building has been completed and is in use for both weekday and weekend services, as well as for marriage services.

An Old Collegian, Bill Farrow ('61), and his family have generously donated a very substantial amount of money with which the College has commissioned a builder to construct a mechanical pipe organ. This will be a wonderful addition to a very splendid building and it is anticipated that it should be in place by the end of next year.

VICE-PRINCIPAL



The departure of Mr David Happell after 13 years of sterling service as Vice-Principal saw the appointment of Mr John Gilson as his successor from

the beginning of 1989.

John, a Senior Chemistry Master and Master-in-Charge of Chemistry at Haileybury College (one of the eleven A.P.S. schools), came with impeccable qualifications. In addition to his responsibilities outlined above, he was a Group Master (in charge of a Year level of boys), a member of the Curriculum Committee and Secretary to the Housemasters at Haileybury. curricular interests spread outside the school, too: for some time he had been Chairman of the V.I.S.E. Chemistry Committee (the body setting courses and examinations for Year 12 Chemistry) and more recently V.C.A.B. Chemistry Course Manager (the body that succeeded V.I.S.E. and the one responsible for the implementation of the new Victorian Certificate of Education). His memberships of academic bodies include the Australian Academy of Science *School Chemistry Advisory Committee*. Experience at Felsted School in England and as a boarding housemaster at Haileybury add to this impressive list of credentials.

John and his wife, Trish, have three sons who are enrolled now at the College and we take this belated opportunity of welcoming them all to the College community with the wish that they have a happy stay. I feel sure that John will make a significant contribution to life at the school; he has already

begun to do so.

A COLLEGE SUNBEAM

Cate Polhemus (Year 10 - Coles) is now a national identity following an article concerning her which appeared in Woman's Day, 2nd May, 1989.

The initiative, courage and concern of Cate led to the production of a magazine called "Sunbeam" which is distributed to young people, generally under thirteen years of age, who suffer from bone cancer. Cate was diagnosed with cancer when she was eight years old, but just over three years ago went into remission and is determined to stay

Not so fortunate was a friend, Ann Hollier, who died of bone cancer over four years ago when she was twelve. However, Ann and Cate had the idea of the magazine and began its publication. Following Ann's death, Cate continued to edit "Sunbeam" in her memory.

The Woman's Day article has doubled the subscribers list, and help has been needed from the Anti-cancer Council and Red Cross, to help cover costs.

The story of Cate Polhemus is not only an encouragement to her readers through "Sunbeam", but to fellow students at the College who will appreciate Cate and her disease a little better. Cate has considered becoming a journalist, but presently hopes to study law when she gets to university.

YEAR 12 CURRENT **AFFAIRS**

The string orchestra recently gained first place in its section of the Warrnambool Eisteddfod and, in doing so, attracted high praise from the adjudicators.


CURRICULUM EVENINGS

HOUSE OF GUILDS

HOUSE OF GUILDS

When the House of Guilds began in 1935, the College had a large number of boarders and, by the forties, there were four boarding houses on the present Senior School site. The House of Guilds provided facilities for the boys to indulge in a great many activities which taught them skills in the use of timber, clay, leather, textiles, metal, paint and ink and stone. There was scarcely an avenue which was not explored.

Outside the gates the Ramblers' Guild went on hikes and expeditions to many parts of Australia, in some cases making first ascents and adding to the State Herbarium and Museum collections.

The House of Guilds was run by the Warden, who was also the Art teacher, and a council of students, each of whom looked after one aspect of the activities. The senior student was the Sub-Warden and acted as chairman of the regular Council Meetings.

The contemporary House of Guilds operates under quite different circumstances, even to being in different premises. The boarding numbers have fallen by two-thirds and the once strong boarder patronage is substantially reduced.

An even more profound change is that almost all the activities once provided by the House of Guilds only are available to students in the normal school curriculum. For instance, woodwork, photography, painting, ceramics, textiles, printmaking and sculpture can be taken as units of work, or as full-time subjects, and hundreds of students are involved in these, once exclusively House of Guilds pursuits.


The House of Guilds plays host to the Ceramics and Textile classes, with students taking these subjects through to Year 12. In addition, it provides support facilities for a range of subjects

(including Woodwork, Graphic Communication and Painting) as well as being a general purpose workshop for public and school use. It is open for fifty-six hours a week - a fact appreciated by the many non-College members who make use of the facilities offered.

It is unfortunate that the student government of the old House of Guilds could not cope with the full-time demands of the present, for there is now no student participation in the running of the place. In balance, though, the variety of interests and expertise arising from the wider membership base compensates for this and, what is even more important, the House of Guilds now provides a model in the shared use of school resources which other schools in both the private and state systems could well emulate.

MR FRED ELLIOTT

Mr. Fred Eliott attended the College as a boarder from 1940 to 1946 and traces many of his present interests back to that time. He was a member of the Glee Club and other choirs, the Orchestra, a founding member of the Brass Band and a member of the Music Committee.

The College had a very strong Church youth group (the P.F.A.) of which he was a committee member and he has maintained a close interest in Church work.

When John Bechervaise returned to the H.O.G. and ran that remarkable series of hikes and expeditions, there was no keener participant than Fred who has spent a lifetime following this interest. He has even over the last two years returned to Rodondo Island (off Wilson's Promontory) and Federation Peak in the south- west of Tasmania two of the great conquests with John.

Don Webb developed Fred's interest for drawing and painting and he went on to study art at the Gordon and the Melbourne Teachers' College where he gained his T.T.C.(Man. Arts) and Hockey colours. His teaching positions have been at Colac High School, G.G.S. Corio, and Timbertop, where he was in charge of outdoor activities and, for a time, Acting Head.

In 1953, 1955 and 1958 he was a member of A.N.A.R.E. wintering parties at Heard Island, Mawson and Davis and assisted in the establishment of Mawson base in 1954. He was awarded the Polar Medal and Clasp and is proud to have an Antarctic peak named after him.

In 1959 he married Margaret Darby, who, having been a Housematron at G.G.S. Corio, was no stranger to boys' boarding houses when Fred took over Warrinn in 1963. Their daughters, Kirsty and Libby, grew up at College and were among the early intake of girls when the College became co-educational.

He has been back at the College since 1963 teaching a variety of subjects in addition to art and has been both a Boarding Housemaster and a Day Housemaster, Master-in-Charge of Hockey, Cross-Country Running and Outdoor Activities, Warden of the House of Guilds, Director of the Austin Gray Centre and Head of the Department of Fine and Applied Arts. During this period he was President of the O.G.C.A. for two years and was made an Honorary Life Member of the Association. Fred is still the Director of the Austin Gray Centre, which incorporates the House of Guilds and is situated at the old Preparatory School site

MACKIE HOUSE

A College Prospectus of the 1940's reminds one of the changes that have taken place in the school since the opening of Mackie in 1939. No longer can Mackie be seen from the front steps of the Dining Hall. The Coles Science Block screens the view. In 1939 there were four boarding houses (and Mackie was the newest); today Mackie is the sole remaining boys' House. Meals in the Dining Hall would appear different for a student who attended the school in the 1940's - now boys and girls sit at the tables enjoying a meal together.

Mackie developed a proud history as the House for Year 9 (third form) boys where John Carrington began to mould raw youths into young men. These days, the staff have in many cases, four years in which to reinforce values, standards and traditions with the boys. The results in recent times have been impressive: in the past four years the House has produced one School Captain, one School Vice-Captain, one School Dux and nine School Prefects. Sportsmen from Mackie continue to make a fine contribution to the school, and in some cases, to local football clubs and the Victorian and Australian athletic scene. There is more to Mackie than this though, for between sixty and sixty-five boys, Mackie is home for 38 weeks of the year.

The House staff bear the responsibility of looking after charges. Apart from sitting in the Duty Office taking leave, staff involve themselves in House life. This can take many forms, including: excursions to the beach, sport with other schools, arranging dinners and suppers, organising competitions amongst the boys, or simply sitting down to help solve complicated mathematical problems. This staff involvement brings about the good relationship that exists between the staff and the students.









Prefects are an important cog in the House. They are appointed from the Year 12 group by the Head of House, in consultation with the staff. Led by the House Captain, they are responsible for the day-to-day running of the House-waking the House in the morning, performing roll calls, monitoring supper, checking boys are in bed and generally setting a positive example to the rest of the House. Most prefects respond to the challenge of the position and once they have left school, it appears to stand them in good stead for later life.

An old Collegian who was in Mackie during the "Jack" Carrington era would notice a number of changes between then and now. We have carpet on the floor, the showers are hot, the dormitories are divided into bed-study cubicles and "prep" is no longer done in the prep-room, which is now divided into Senior and Junior T.V. rooms.

Whilst it may appear that Mackie boys in 1989 have it easier than their forebears, it must be remembered that times have changed. The 1939 Pegasus stated that Mackie was the best Boarding House in the Empire but it has to keep up with changing times and modern standards. This is why Mackie has changed, and hopefully, will continue to maintain its position as a premier boarding house.

ARCHIVES

Additional Archival material which was gratefully received from the Mackie House Reunion were from: Ian Holmes ('45) - a book "Memoirs of Great Commanders* inscribed by the Headmaster, George Morrison, *To Allan McKenzie, with best wishes from George Morrison, Geelong College, Christmas 1897*. Garth Strong ('56), a letter from John Carrington inviting Garth to join the Mackie House Committee. John Waugh (49) donated his book of newspaper cuttings, photos, and daily weights of the 1953 1st VIII. Jack Grummett ('46) produced five 1949 Chez Nous, the College Newspaper for a number of years and some interesting postcards of the College 1905 - 1909 including one which was written by Alan Tait, noted scholar and sportsman in his school days (1903 - 1908), and who joined the staff in 1921, was Head of Scots, Queensland, 1931-38, and then Vice-Principal of the College 1939-57.

Another recent acquisition has been of a good number of early copies of Pegasus from John Lamont ('53).

All these donations of materials are of great value to the Archives and we sincerely thank the donors.

CYCLIST EXTRAORDINAIRE

Rod Evans (71) (above) who will be remembered by many Old Collegians for his cycling exploits in the early 70s, recently came out of retirement to break a world cycling record that many people thought was unbreakable.

In July, Rod wrote his name into the Guinness Book of Records by smashing over 30 days off the 14,000km Around Australia cycling record. Rod's time of 49 days 22 hours and 31 minutes broke the previous record of 80 days set by a four-rider Danish team in 1985 and also broke the 62 day Around Australia relay record. Rod, who was Geelong Amateur Cycling Club Champion and Victorian Junior 50km Road Champion whilst a student at The Geelong College, rode up to 18 hours and often over 400km per day in his effort to break the record.

In trying to overcome the pain bought about on such a ride Rod, at times, had to walk because his feet were too swollen and sore to pedal. Fatigue also caused his vision to become blurred and over the last 10 days of the record, as he struggled to follow the white line on the side of the road, the ride became increasingly difficult as he continually fell asleep while riding his bike.

Leading Rod's support crew of four was his father Peter ('47) a Geelong farmer, himself a former world veteran cycling champion, who slept less than two hours a day for more than 10 days to ensure his son could continue.

Rod who now lives in Perth, says he naturally wants to forget about bike riding for a few weeks, but is already considering future challenges including an attempt on the Across Australia record in 1991 and possible sponsorship offers to attempt to break Sir Hubert Opperman's 24 hour record, a cycling record that has stood unchallenged for over 50 years.
