Henley Race Will be Head-of-River Test

Melbourne Grammar School and Geelong College, standing out as the best of the 1957 Head-of-the-River crews at present and rivals in the first boot race heat on Thursday, April 11, will meet in a pre-race test at Henley-on-Yarra on Saturday.

The two crews are eight-D. R. drawn with the very stroke; D. Mel strong Corlo Bay crew in the third heat of the Founders' Challenge Cup, for junior eights, and their winning chances are about even.





An estimated time of 4 min. 30 sec. was announced, but this later was amended to approximately 4.36.

Then the time for the second heat was given as 433, but this was changed to 437 when the timekeeper told officials they had misheard him.

Close Finishes

The biggest margin in any of the nine heats for the first, second and third crews was one length and a half. Other winning margins varied from three feet to three-quarters of a length.

Melbourne Grammar. which averaged 12 st. 12 lb. and Geelong College (average 12 st. 8 % ib.) were the heaviest of the Head of the River crews.

Geelong College won its heat from start to finish. Three-quarters of a length in front at Anderson Street Bridge and half a length at the half-mile, College's advantage was reduced to oneSwan Street




